File Your Paperwork

CONSTITUTIONAL REQUIREMENTS

- Must be a natural born citizen of the United States
- Must be a resident for 14 years
- Must be 35 years of age or older


LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

- After raising \$5000 dollars, automatically a candidate for President and must file a Statement of Candidacy with the Federal Election Commission (online or by paper)
- Must designate authorized campaign committee within 10 days and file a Statement of Organization form with the FEC



Win the Electoral College & the Presidency

- Win a majority of electoral votes (270+) and win the Presidency
- If no candidate wins a majority of votes, House decides the President and Senate the Vice President
- The President-elect is inaugurated the following January 20 at 12 P.M. EST
