What we noticed: • Talking crosswalks that vibrate when touched • Detectable warning pavers in front of crosswalks Priority seating on public transportation • Bus height can lower to accommodate the elderly and people with disabilities • Free 24/7 crisis hotline (*Crisis Text Line*) • Western Pennsylvania School for Blind Children Demographics 2013-2017:

 9.9% of Pittsburghers under the age of 65 have a disability

301,048 (as of 2018)

• Detectable warning pavers in front of crosswalks

- What we noticed:
- Longwood Disability Resources
- Crosswalks with visual cues on streets
 - that have heavy foot traffic
- Demographics 2013-2017
 - 5.8% of Farmville citizens under the age of 65 have a disability
 - Overall population: 7,872 (as of 2018)



Conclusions

- Disabilities are not only physical, they are invisible as well.
- There is a stigma in society regarding individuals with mental and physical disabilities that stems from ignorance. We believe this stigma needs to be challenged.
- While every individual has their own lens in which they see the world, those with a disability have unique life experiences that provide them with differing perspectives in which they see the world.
- Overall, Pittsburgh is more accommodating towards people with disabilities.

- Study other cities including Washington D.C. and mid-sized cities to see if the size of the city affects the level of accessibility in the city.
