Courses in the Concentration (24 cr.)

Required Courses:

ENGL 301 Rhetorical Criticism: *Practice in rhetorical approaches to analyze non-literary texts using various theoretical frameworks.* **Spring even years**

ENGL 302 History of Rhetoric: A history of the major figures, texts, and rhetorical movements from Gorgias to the 20th century. **Spring odd years**

ENGL 303 Visual Rhetoric & Document Design: Study of visual artifacts as ideological constructs. Practice of visual rhetoric in the design of workplace documents. **Fall odd years**

ENGL 305 Rhetoric & Public Culture: Exploration of classical and contemporary rhetorical principles within a featured segment of public culture. **Every Fall**

ART 353 Artists' Books: An introduction to bookmaking, tools, design, image melding, and structure. Or ART 357 Editions: An integration of papermaking, printmaking, bookbinding, image, and text. Every Spring

ENGL 319 Technical Writing: *Creation of instruction manuals and concise data displays. Practice in translating technical language for the non-specialist.* **Every semester**

ENGL 470/570 Professional Writing Skills: *Creation of workplace documents such as memos, brochures, formal reports, informal reports, and job application documents. Client project required.* **Every semester**

ENGL 492 Internship in Professional Writing: Fulfills Gen Ed goal 14. 3 credits, each credit represents 45 hours of work. The student can do a combination of on-site work and a research paper to meet hours required. See student examples at
