In this session, participants will have an opportunity to share how they engage students with the Moton Museum and to explore new ways to enhance and deepen those learning experiences. We will take a brief but deeper dive into the historical context of Prince Edward civil rights history, as well as into the more recent history of the development of the Moton Museum and its partnership with Longwood. In doing so, we will touch upon the social, economic, and political implications of the 1951 student strike and the Prince Edward County school closings at the local, state, and national levels. Keeping their learning experiences in mind, participants will discuss ways to connect the Moton Story to broader questions about identity, power, leadership, and democracy.
