- 1) Classes I have taken that contribute towards the institutions I want to go into
- A. Survey of Criminal Justice (CRIM 100)

This base level class introduced me to the 3 major elements of criminal justice which are courts, corrections and policing. This class peaked my interest in policing/law enforcement which is where I want to go into after college.

B. Into to policing (CRIM 210)

This class was all about policing and then policies that come with that
