1. How do institutions structure my own behavior?

For example, I wrote my CRIM senior seminar paper on the death penalty and I found that statistically and when it comes to crime prevention, it is not an effective policy. One final behavior that I have grasped since being in these two majors is simply tuning into the news and what is going on outside of Virginia and the United States. I never used to be up to date with things like this because growing up, my parents never had the news on and I was in my own bubble. I have been opened up to what is going on around the world and it has bettered me as a sociologist and criminologist.

2. How can I use these skills in my future job?

All 4 skills I listed that I obtained in college being a CRIM/SOCL double major have a common attribute of being aware about what is going on around me and being non-bias. Both of which are key aspects to law enforcement. Without being aware of what is going on in the world, I would not be able to perform my job to the upmost best ability due to being disconnected to the rest of the law enforcement around the globe. Being non bias is one of the biggest factors in becoming an officer because you must be able to treat everyone fairly or else you could be violating the Constitution.
