Proposed Project Statement


• Kilts are very important to the people of Scotland who take pride in representing their family name by wearing the kilt patterns that are connected to their ancestral clan. This piece covers the historical culture and heritage of Scottish descendants around the world who appreciate their family's ancestry by wearing Scotland's national dress of kilts. There is a vast supply of information, from a broad variety of sources, that provides a very thorough understanding of the history and appreciation of the Scottish kilt. This piece is made from multiple sheets, made with green pulp, that are couched together to form large sheets and smaller sheets, made from blue pulp, that are cut into thin strips. The thin strips are then stitched into the green sheets to form the kilt pattern of my family, the Walters family.

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Repeated Motif/Pattern

• The motif that I will be repeating from historical kilts is the kilt pattern from my family's ancestral clan, the Walters family. This pattern is shown to the right.

• What I will be exaggerating in the kilt that I make will be the proportion of the size to the wearer. This picture demonstrates how this exaggeration will look.






Process: Fibers

- I will be making larger green sheets and multiple couching them together to form the base of the kilt.
- Also, I will make smaller blue sheets and cut them into thin lines.
- I will be stitching these different color sheets together to make the pattern shown in my sketch that is the kilt pattern of my family's clan.
- The fiber I will use to make the sheets is tyvek. I will also be using string to stitch them together



Process: Cast element





Work Schedule

- 11/30/2021- Coming into the studio at about 5:15pm to begin making the large green base sheets.
- 12/1/2021- Coming in at about 3:45 pm to continue making the green base sheets.
- 12/2/2021- If done making the large green base sheets, starting to make the smaller blue sheets and if not done then continuing the green sheets.
- 12/3/2021- Once all sheets are done being made, cutting the blue sheets into thin strips and stitching them into the green sheets to make the pattern.
