## Power

The power of stereotypes is extravagant. No matter how different someone can be from a stereotype, people still don't trust them based on that stereotype alone. Kendi also mentioned that parents would pay loads of money to make sure their kids would go to other schools away from children of color or students that fit a specific stereotype (Kendi, 35-36).

The use of race as power has been around for a very long time. Kendi agrees that it can be dangerous for others: "It felt big, bigger than me, bigger than my parents or anything in my world, and threatening. What a powerful constriction race is – powerful enough to consume us" (Kendi, 37). I remember one time I had a discussion with one of my friends who had mentioned that in her class, they discussed racism. According to the Merriam-Webster dictionary, the definition of racist is "of, relating to, or characterized by the systemic oppression of a racial group to the social, economic, and political advantage of another." Our perspective is that people of color could use their minority status, or the color of their skin, as an excuse for acting a certain way or to be able to do or not to do something. People of color could use their power over white people in multiple occasions. One of the best examples that I could think of that happened to me personally is that while I worked at a water park over the summer, I sold cabanas. On rainy days, people would receive a partial refund and many people were upset about that. One time, a black couple came up to my window and when I told them their partial refund, they yelled at me saying, "Look at my color! Do you REALLY think that we will be able to afford this again?!"

To be fair, I was following protocol, however, they didn't see it that way. I completely understand their situation and I would have been upset about it too, but there was nothing that I could have done. I believe that they used the color of their skin as an excuse to take advantage of me and that is a main power move. In some cases, people of color could use those stereotypes, that have been created by society, as an excuse. Maybe they would not be able to afford the cabana again, but I don't think that gives them any right to yell at me or assume that even I or my family would be able to afford it either. I have even seen this happen to other co-workers who are also a different race than white.
